#### 3) Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) (Youth)

- a) Coordinator: by John Waterston
- b) What is RYLA
- c) The Rotary International District 7620 RYLA program is an intense 3 day, 2 night leadership training program that is designed to recognize, encourage and further develop the leadership skills of 10th, 11th and 12th grade high school students who have shown a potential for rendering important service to their schools and communities.
  - i) RYLA for High School (10<sup>th</sup> thru 12<sup>th</sup> Grade)
  - ii) Junior RYLA for 7<sup>th</sup> thru 9<sup>th</sup> Grade
- d) Our Club would sponsor student(s) to attend.
- e) RYLA Cost: approximately \$360.00 per student
  - i) Cost includes accommodations, all meals, snacks, program materials, conference t-shirt, 2 nights stay at accommodations and certificate at completion of conference.
- f) Junior RYLA Cost: approximately \$50.00 per student
  - i) Cost includes snacks, lunch, program materials, conference t-shirt and certificate at completion of conference.

#### 4) Four Way Test Speech Contest (Youth)

- a) Coordinator: John Waterston
- b) Any High School student may compete, except for any previous winner of a District 7620 Four-Way Test Speech Contest.
- c) Immediate family members of Rotarians are not eligible to compete.
- d) We would work with a local High School to hold a contest to select a finalist to attend the District Semifinals.
- e) District Top 4 Semifinalist go to the District Finals held at the District 7620 District Conference to compete for cash prize.



# 5) Rotary Vocational Training Team (VTT) (formerly Group Study Exchange) (International/Vocational)

- a) Coordinator: Linda Berg-Cross
- b) Vocational training teams are groups of professionals who travel abroad either to teach local professionals about a particular field or to learn more about their own. Teams can be funded by district grants and global grants.
- c) Benefits of VTTs
  - i) VTTs build on the Foundation's long-standing commitment to vocational training. Activities vary from one team to the next but may include training medical professionals on cardiac surgery and care, sharing best practices on early childhood education, or explaining new irrigation techniques to farmers. A successful VTT increases the capacity of the host community to solve problems and improve the quality of life.
- d) Rotary Areas of Focus: Promoting peace, fighting disease, providing clean water, sanitation and hygiene, saving mother and children, supporting education, growing local economies.
- e) Timeline
  - i) 2019 2020: Research, develop and submit a plan to the District
  - ii) 2020 2021: Implement program

Requirements	Activities support The Rotary Foundation's mission to promote goodwill and peace, improve health, support education, and alleviate poverty	Activities must align with one or more areas of focus, build the capacity of either the team members or the benefiting community, and have a sustainable and measurable impact. The VTT must be sponsored by Rotary clubs or districts from two countries. The grant may support the travel of more than one team.
Team composition	The district may determine the composition of the team to include Rotarians and non-Rotarians of any age.	Teams must consist of at least two members (either Rotarians or non-Rotarians) with at least two years each of professional experience in the designated areas of focus and a Rotarian leader who has expertise in the area of focus, international experience, and general Rotary knowledge. In certain cases, the Foundation may grant permission to designate a non-Rotarian as team leader. There are no restrictions on the age of participants.
