# Captured by the Russians – A True Story Charles S. Burrall



Charles Burrall was raised in upstate New York and graduated from St. Lawrence University in 1976 with a B.A. in English. He lived eight years in Alaska where he worked as a commercial fishing deckhand and ship's steward in the U.S. Merchant Marine. He is a retired high school English teacher who taught for twenty-five years at Seneca Valley High School in Montgomery County, Maryland. While in Alaska, Mr. Burrall worked on a freighter that was seized by the Soviet Union and taken captive to Siberia. He has written a book about the experience.

Before entering his teaching career, he worked at a variety of jobs, including restaurants, construction crews, canneries, and fishing boats. He traveled widely in the United States, Mexico, Europe, and the Middle East before coming to Maryland, where he currently volunteers in the jail ministry of his church, preaching and conducting church services for inmates at the Frederick County Detention Center.

## Food Insecurity in Montgomery County Cathy Higgins, Volunteer Coordinator, Nourishing Bethesda



Food insecurity is defined as a lack of consistent access to enough food for an active, healthy life. Parts of Bethesda suffered food insecurity at rates up to 16 percent. Since March 2020, this number has increased by more than 35 percent. In 2021, North Bethesda Rotary joined the Nourishing Bethesda coalition to assist with a food delivery program. Since then, the program has evolved into an appointment-based food distribution system involving more than 300 families in Montgomery County.

**Cathy Higgins** began volunteering with Nourishing Bethesda in 2021. She currently serves as Nourishing Bethesda's Volunteer Coordinator, while also working on community partnerships and communications. She retired in 2021 as a Federal Senior Executive with 36 years of service working on national security issues. Cathy and her husband Jim have lived in North Bethesda for over 30 years and have two adult children.

## Water Supply Issues in the Washington Area Curtis M. Dalpra, Communications Manager, Interstate Commission on the Potomac River Basin



With the Western United States battling the most severe drought in thousands of years and states and cities facing water restrictions and shortages, local leaders are looking closely at their water resources. The Potomac River is the source of water for most of the Washington area, and the Interstate Commission on the Potomac River Basin (ICBRB), based in Rockville, plays a key role in managing the region's water supply.

**Curtis Dalpra**, Communications Manager for ICPRB has directed the agency's public affairs and outreach efforts since 1995. He manages ICPRB's Communications Unit, responsible for the agency's public persona and fulfilling the Compact goal of outreach to the public to educate about Potomac River issues and to promote public stewardship.

He has worked closely with the ICPRB administration to educate decision-makers about ICPRB and to build both popular and political support for the agency and the Potomac River. He has been heavily involved in ICPRB's recent efforts to ensure that the ICPRB membership is well-informed about the value the Commission brings to the basin and its jurisdictions.

## DISTRICT GRANTS

## District 7620 Grant Guidelines

The window for grant applications submission for Rotary Year 2022-2023 is March 1, 2023 – May 31, 2023; grant application submissions received after that date are unlikely to be funded.

- Grants applications submission are only acceptable electronically via DACdb Grants Module
- The Club President and Club Foundation Chair (during the year the grant is approved) (or a designated appointee, who will be involved with the management of the grant) <u>must</u> attend grant management and qualification training arranged by the District and maintain a trained member for the term of the grant.
- For a Grant Applicant to be eligible to receive DDF funding, the TRF's "Club Foundation Analysis Report" must reflect by June 30, 2023 the below accomplishments:
  - \$120 per capita minimum of club membership total giving to the Annual Fund.
  - 50% of club members contribute \$25 to the Annual Fund.
  - 50% of club members are a Paul Harris Fellow.
- Club with approved grants will receive 50% of their grant money upon review and approval of the project; the remaining 50% will be paid upon the completion of all report requirements of the project.
